DID YOU KNOW?

The Cornish artist Peter Lanyon flew a glider (a plane without an engine). He was interested in how the land looked from the air. His paintings sometimes show the land directly from above (like a map) and sometimes show the land tilting as if he was in an aircraft swooping in the sky.

Landscape paintings or photographs that show a wide sweep of country from an elevated position are known as "bird's eye" views

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
